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

Today's fishers in Tribunj


- Fishers believe that their role in society is not sufficiently appreciated.
- Fishers are often characterised as "destroyers of the environment" in the media.
- However, they have been actively participating in the collection of marine waste since 2014.
- Women now work less on boats and more in providing support in the administrative tasks, sales and processing plants.
- Fishers have no formal education; they are trained by boat owners.





Current challenges

- Limited access to funding to renew the fishing fleet and invest in vessels.
- Informal education and training of fishers.
- Prices of fish on the market have remained unchanged for the last 10 years.
- Work schedules are largely dependent on weather conditions and mandatory freeways.
- Fishers are forced to find alternative sources of income.
- Uncontrolled nautical tourism and leisure fishing.
- Increasing waste in the sea that destroys fishers' tools.





Opportunities for the future

- Raise awareness of fishers' important role in society; their work, sacrifice and effort in providing fish to the market.
- Encourage younger generations to engage in fishing. Educate them and depict a more positive image of the profession.
- Adapt regulations so that they address the reality of fishers and are enforceable.
- Invest in the renewal of the fishing fleet and sustainable fishing.
- Involve fishers in the management of protected areas.
